Illinois Libraries Presents: Ruth E. Carter Interweaving Tradition and **Imagination Through Costume Design** Wednesday, March 20, 7:00p

Academy Award winning costume designer Ruth E. Carter explores the passion that inspires her pieces spanning Spike Lee costume design to Wakanda.

Join us for a special event with Ruth E. Carter, the first Black person to win an Oscar (let alone two!) for Best Costume Design. She won her first Academy Award for the movie Black Panther and the second for its sequel, Black Panther: Wakanda Forever. Ruth E. Carter's ability to develop an authentic story through costume and character made her one of the most sought after and renowned costume designers today. Best known for turning the Black Panther superhero into an African king, Carter is the first Black woman to win multiple Academy Awards in any category and the first costume designer to win for a film and its sequel. She also garnered additional Academy Award nominations as well as an Emmy nomination. Carter is known for her research and diligence to the craft of costume design, specifically for her work on historical films such as Spike Lee's Malcolm X, Steven Spielberg's Amistad and Ava DuVernay's Selma. Ruth E. Carter will be joined in conversation with Aisha Harris, co-host of NPR's Pop Culture Happy Hour and author of Wannabe. Z

BOARD MEMBER SINCE NOVEMBER 2019

What brought you to Dunlap?

I have lived in Dunlap since 1970, coming here by way of Cincinnati, where I had taught English at Miami University. Attracting me to the area was the new community college. The first in my family to attend college, I understood the tremendous impact an institution of learning can have upon lives. My career at Illinois Central College, first as a teacher and then as an administrator, was fulfilling. My wife and I raised two children, a boy and a girl, both of whom attended Dunlap schools.

Why did you want to be a Dunlap Public Library District Trustee?

Having reaped the benefits of living in a community, I feel obliged to give something back. I have done this by serving on boards, including the Dunlap School Board. As indicated by the profession I chose, books have a special importance to me. Even as a child, I hung out at the library. Long before the invention of the Internet, the library has been a hub of learning and it still is.

What is your favorite way to use our library?

During my professional life, I would go to the library to get the information I needed, information that was verified and reliable. The Dunlap Public Library is a conduit for information from libraries throughout the state. Like many former English teachers, I blush to admit I like to write, and in retirement, I indulge that secret pleasure. When researching a subject, I can trust our local librarians to get that book I need, no matter specialized or esoteric, even one from the massive library at the University of Illinois (one of the best in the country).

Retirement also provides me time for entertainment, and I get that at a nominal cost. My neighbors amaze me at their readiness to pay exorbitant monthly rates for the various media services, when the same movies and popular television series are available for free from the library on DVD's or through its hoopla stream. This is also true for magazine and newspaper subscriptions.

What is something about the library you want the community to know?

Finally, I enjoy the library as a place. From a world of noise and constant motion, it is a haven of quiet and comfort, a perfect place to concentrate or just to breathe out and relax. This is especially true of a small, rural library like our own.
